# Report



The Final Multiplier Event organized in Milan was aimed at summarizing and disseminating the learnings coming from the project and do step forward (future strategies for all partner cities and action plan for Milan). # Title: How to support families that are not used to reading in reading promotion:

# Family literacy and parentalinvolvement

How to inform parents about the active role they can play themselves in the development of the literacy skills of their child? In this workshop, we tackle this question from the perspective of low literate parents. We first present "Welcome in the classroom", a project by Brusselleer (Center for Basic Education Brussels) that is designed to explore and broaden the interaction between parents and children in the classroom. It focuses on the skills and competences the parents already have and strengthens their wellbeing and proximity(?). In the second part of the workshop, we focus on various approaches to persuade low literate parents to discover and use the library.

Workshop facilitated by Turku Team Title: Learning social-emotional skills and language through reading

This Workshop approaches social-emotional skills from the perspective of the engagement in reading and connecting meaningful activities to reading.

The social-emotional skills supported by the content of reading, during the act of reading and in activities pre, during and post reading.

In this workshop the concept of story handles not just children's literature but also children's stories. Here, stories are understood as a wider concept than just verbal tales, but also visual and multimodal stories/narratives.

# Title: How to co-design activities for children and families (a family-centered approach)
